

Pursuant to Penal Code Section 933.05, I am responding to the above- mentioned Grand Jury Report		Coroner 473-6043

F1. On-officer cameras have b	een found to reduce citizen complaints and	473-7393

increase officer safety, but only three law enforcement agencies in the County are using these cameras.

I agree with this finding.

F2. Financial constraints are the reasons most cited by the law enforcement agencies that have not purchased modern audiovisual equipment.

• I partially disagree with this finding. I am not aware of the cost implications of other jurisdictions, but whether or not we equip ourselves with audiovisual equipment, funding is not an issue.

As of this report, the Sheriff's Department has not expressed an interest in purchasing body cameras.

I wholly disagree with this finding. When I met with the Grand Jury, Sergeant Fred Marziano of our Technology Services Unit accompanied

I clearly remember that both Sergeant Marziano and I explained that we have been evaluating the use of audiovisual body equipment. Sergeant Marziano explained very thoroughly that up until this point we have been concerned about the quality and durability of the equipment as well as the storage of the data. It should be noted that when I received the draft of the report, it indicated that there are five days in which to contact the Grand Jury if the report contained any mistakes. I contacted Foreperson Nadine Muller and explained my concern with the Grand Jury's findings. I was told that the report would not be changed.

## R1. The Grand Jury recommends that the Sheriff's Department and all police departments in the County use on-officer cameras.

 I cannot speak for other agencies in the County, but as far as the Sheriff's Office is concerned, this recommendation requires further analysis. In addition to my comments in F3, we have had conversations with at least two companies that manufacture audiovisual equipment. I would say that in the next several months we will select a geographical patrol area and test equipment to determine if we will permanently implement the technology.

# R3. The Grand Jury recommends that the Sheriff's Department request funds from the Board of Supervisors for on-officer cameras and pursue grants and other funding sources.

As I mentioned in F2, funding for such technology is not an issue. At the
point and time that we determine that we will implement the equipment,
there are a number of funding sources available. It will not require
requesting funds from the Marin County Board of Supervisors.

We are writing to you as members of the Implementation Review Committee of the Marin Chapter of the California Civil Grand Jurors' Association. Our Association's goals are to support the civil grand jury system and promote local government accountability. Our Chapter is composed of former Marin County Civil Grand Jurors. One of the tasks of the Implementation Review Committee is to follow-up on responses to prior Grand Jury recommendations to ascertain the status of their implementation.

Specifically, we are following up on a response to a recommendation in a letter dated September 30, 2015 concerning the Marin County Civil Grand Jury's February 18, 2014 report titled "Get the Picture? Audiovisual Technology and Marin Law Enforcement".

In that letter, you responded to Recommendation 1 of this report as follows:

**Recommendation 1:** The Grand Jury recommends that the Sheriff's Department and all police departments in the County use on-officer cameras.

**Response:** "I refer you to the second part of Recommendation 1 whereby in my response I indicated that we would be testing equipment in one of our patrol areas. In the next few days that test will begin in our Substation in Marin City".

Grand Jury Report: Get the Picture? Audiovisual Technology and Marin Law

Tom,

Since my earlier response to the Grand Jury's report, "Get the Picture? Audiovisual Technology and Marin Law Enforcement," we have actively deployed two different body worn camera systems to the field in an attempt to identify which technology platform best suits the needs of my department. Those two camera systems are produced by Taser International and Vievu. Both have been in the field for several months and both are being worn by select deputies assigned to our Marin City Sub-Station. Additional camera systems are being vetted now to see if they too warrant a field test as well.

In addition to the on-going camera beta tests, executive and management staff members have been actively researching best practices by contacting a number of different California law enforcement agencies who have a history of using body worn cameras, as well as those who have more recently deployed them to the field. Undersheriff Ridgway is in fact attending a conference later this week on civil rights and government tort law, because a main element of that symposium will focus on the use of body worn cameras by law enforcement.

Behind the scenes, staff will be attending a February 19<sup>th</sup> Tech Summit hosted by Taser International so they can study the data storage issues related to the deployment of body worn cameras and others have been assigned to participate in a February 5<sup>th</sup> webinar covering policy considerations for law enforcement agencies who are planning to deploy body worn cameras to the field as well.

As I'm sure you can appreciate, deploying a new piece of technology in an agency of our size, particularly one that involves such significant policy, data storage, and cost challenges as this one does, is not as simple a problem to solve as it might be for some of the smaller agencies in Marin. As an example, the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office recently entered into a contract with Taser International to supply cameras for each of their patrol deputies. While the cost of the cameras themselves was rather manageable, the cost of storing the data those cameras were expected to produce drove the cost of the project to over 1 million dollars.

Thank you for your continued interest and please know that I remain committed to ensuring as much transparency in our operations as possible.

**Subject: Body Cameras** 

Mr. Borden:

The following is the information I told you that I would forward to you, in my earlier email.

As you mentioned in your email to the Sheriff, the Marin County Sheriff's Office conducted paper evaluations on several different camera systems that are commonly used by law enforcement agencies throughout the country. As a result, we opted to conduct a detailed physical evaluation of two system over the course of several months. During that evaluation period, we also attended a symposium in Sacramento regarding the use of body worn cameras, which was attended by law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

The final results of our evaluation process overwhelmingly showed that one vendor was able to meet the needs of our agency. We then requested the vendor to attend a meeting of Sheriff's Office command staff to provide a presentation and to discuss the associated costs and issues with moving forward, which was completed approximately 3-4 weeks ago.

At this point we are in the process of creating a potential use policy, as well as determining the best way to involve the community in discussions and/or providing them with information regarding our intent to move forward with this technology. We are also discussing how best to work with the records retention process and release of captured data if presented with a request

through the Freedom of Information process. We are also trying to determine the best approach to deal with the costs associated with this process.

While I am not sure if you have direct questions, I would be more than happy to discuss this further with you. Please feel free to contact me at any time should you want or need additional information.
